PROGRAMME SUMMARY

As the conflict prolongs and Syrian refugees in Jordan continue to take difficult measures for survival, the decision by the Jordanian government announced in November 2014 that medical care is no longer free-of-charge for the over 650,000 Syrians in Jordan brought a huge negative impact to the lives of the refugees, especially for the vulnerable families living with no or limited means of income besides humanitarian assistance.

In the health referrals mechanism to governmental health facilities the institutions charge services at a much higher rate than the subsidized rate set to refugees who pay for services themselves. Therefore, the *Cash for Health* action facilitated access to qualified medical care for refugees through the cash assistance system that allowed them to

access public hospitals and get promptly reimbursed for necessary health care treatments. During the first half of 2016, over 1,000 cases were referred using the *Cash for Health* mechanism.

According to this mechanism, entitled families receive a debit card on which the agencies entrusted to the various types of assistance can accredit the amount related



to health care. Thus, beneficiaries can independently benefit from the health facilities at minimum cost, and subsequently receive a reimbursement.

The provision of cash for health targeted nearly 2,700 refugees in need of antenatal and postnatal care, delivery services, and urgent medical cases. Nearly half of the referrals were related to caesarean section followed by other emergency referrals, neonatal care, normal vaginal delivery, high-risk pregnancy, and antenatal care.

Each case in average costs around USD 358, and compared to the rate applied to referrals through an NGO, there has been nearly 73% savings.
